Reasons for change: your studies

Studying a new course at a higher level can present new challenges. Teaching or assessment styles may be very different. Support is available from a variety of sources:

- **Academic support** can be provided via the **Centre for Academic Success** (see <http://library.bcu.ac.uk/learner> for more information), or the Personal Development Centre if you are studying in the Faculty of Health.
- Workshops run by Student Services: check the iCity pages for the latest information.
- **Dyslexia** screening and support can also be provided via Student Services.

The subject area

Sometimes the reality of studying or settling into your studies can present a number of challenges. After the induction has ended, ask yourself how the course is going.

If you are experiencing doubts about the course, talk to tutors at an **early stage** about the modules and the subject areas available.

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Don't forget

It is advisable to speak to a **Finance Adviser** at Student Services, who can suggest alternative ways of funding a new course, as well as explaining what will happen about your existing tuition fees and/or student loans. You will also need to contact your LEA grants and awards office.

Overseas students must see an International Student Adviser before changing or leaving their course to discuss their immigration rights.

- Applications are usually made online and have dates within the application cycle.
- Research different courses and make contact with the admissions tutor for that area. Find out about places, entry requirements and application procedure.
- Check about possible credits transfer too and whether you would have to start from the first year.

Action points:

- Talk to your tutor or lecturer about your thoughts
- If you are sure that you would like to change course or even direction it is important that you gather the most up to date information on the options available.

Finally...

Remember that the process of changing course can be difficult but it is important to focus on the positives.

Explore the possibility of intermitting and returning at a later date. This can help you to decide whether to stay where you are or to change.
