What to do?

GETTING AROUND THE CITY

Here in Birmingham, there are plenty of ways to get around, both locally and further afield. With everything being close by, most journeys can be taken by foot, but if you need to quickly get to class or the corner shop, Voi scooters are a cost-efficient, eco-friendly and fast option that can be accessed via an app.

West Midlands Metro is also an option. The trams cover much of the city and stop in convenient places such as the Library of Birmingham and Town Hall, which is perfect for those not familiar with the city just yet. They even go as far as Wolverhampton, and a route down to Digbeth is also to be finished later in 2022.

Not forgetting New Street Station, home to railways connecting Birmingham to the rest of the UK and alongside the intercity line, which is perfect for students living just outside of the city centre. The station is also home to Grand Central, a modern shopping and eating hub, so you don't need to pop in just to catch a train.



HARBORNE

A chic hotspot of the city, Harborne is a 15-minute bus ride from the city centre and a short walk from our City South Campus. The area is home to a range of things to do, including a monthly farmers market which is held on the second Saturday of each month, and Harborne Walkway, a trail that follows an old railway track all the way into town; perfect for a quiet escape on your doorstep.

Other than this, Harborne is the perfect area for student nightlife, with our top pick being The Plough, known for its all-day brunch and seasonal beer garden that hosts frozen margaritas and tacos in the summer, with wings and waffles in the winter. We know you won't want to miss out on this one!

JEWELLERY QUARTER




NIGHTLIFE

OUTDOOR SPACES

Being outdoors is well-known to aid your mental health and physical wellbeing. Birmingham has 8,000 acres of green space and over 500 parks, including Cannon Hill Park and Manor Hill Park, which are both short distances away on public transport.

One of the highest and lengthiest hiking spots in Birmingham is Lickey Hills, which is situated just a few miles outside of the city centre and easily accessible via New Street Station. QUIETER TOURIST SPOTS

If you want to enjoy the history of Birmingham from a more peaceful point of view, there are plenty of spots to explore around the city.

You may not know that Birmingham was the inspiration for many of the settings in Lord of the Rings and The Hobbit, with J.R.R. Tolkien having studied in the city from the age of eight. You can immerse yourself in the world of Middle Earth by taking the Tolkien Trail, an excursion that will take you around the natural sights and buildings that inspired the films.

Birmingham is home to many weird and wonderful museums including The Pen Room, situated in the historical Jewellery Quarter. Learn about how pens from Birmingham were once responsible for most of the written words in the world! Pens not quite your cup of tea? How about the National Museum of British Culture, an exhibition that feels like going into a time machine

If you prefer a stroll around art galleries, IKON is an internationally-acclaimed contemporary art gallery that has free entry (although donations are accepted!). Stop at the in-house coffee shop and take a seat outside, giving you a beautiful view of the building's neo-gothic architecture.

ROCK MUSIC

Birmingham is said to be the home of heavy metal, with the likes of Black Sabbath (fronted by Ozzy Osbourne), Judas Priest, and lead singer of Led Zeppelin originating from the city. You can find many spots around the city that pay homage to our musical roots, including bars that revolve around the rock genre such as Subside and Scruffy Murphy's. Making a trip to Oasis Market, situated in the heart of the city centre, will complete your experience; you can update your vinyl record collection or grab a new band t-shirt. You may also want to take a walk down the Birmingham Walk of Fame, where you can spot musical stars and more.

The city also annually hosts Supersonic Festival, a music event hailed as the UK's best small festival that embraces the heaviness of Birmingham's music heritage. If you're into music, you don't want to miss this one.



SHOPPING

It's fair to say Birmingham's got you covered when it comes to shopping, from high street stores to restored Victorian arcades, markets that pop-up throughout the week to top-notch thrift shops for those second-hand bargains.

Birmingham is a shoppers' paradise. The famous Bullring is packed with modern, glossy, big brand shops. It's always developing, opening new stores and staying on trend. For high-end choices start with the luxurious Harvey Nichols and the iconic Birmingham Selfridges. There's also Grand Central which offers yet more top brands and a wide selection of tasty food, and not to mention it's the gateway to the city.

Where to shop?




WATER

XMAS MARKET



ZOO AND SAFARI PARK

Birmingham is home to the Birmingham Wildlife Conservation Park, which originally began its life as Birmingham Zoo in 1974. It's a muchloved destination for anybody wild about wildlife and is home to lemurs, wallabies and the must-see red pandas. The park is based a short bus ride from BCU in Cannon Hill Park, just south of the city.

If you're willing to travel a little further afield, West Midlands Safari Park is a must-do, unique experience accessible by train or bus. Home to 1,400 animals and spanning over four miles, the self-drive safari also offers minibus tours for those who don't drive. You'll be able to meet the Indian rhinos, cheetahs, lions, tigers, and even baby elephants!
