Academic Regulations: Assessment, Progression and Award	<ul> <li>Amendment to the regulation on commencement of study (2.4.1). The final point at which students can commence study and be engaged with learning and teaching has been changed to Friday of week four (formerly Monday of week four). Late arrivals and course transfers will not normally be permitted after the Friday (formerly the Monday) of week four.</li> <li>The regulations on Permanent Withdrawal (PWD) and Suspension of Studies (SOS) have been removed and are now included in the Change of Circumstance Policy.</li> <li>The regulations on Late Submission of Assessment have been removed and are now included in a separate Late Submission of Assessment Policy.</li> <li>The regulations on Extenuating Circumstances have been removed. The process for claiming Extenuating Circumstances is set out in the Extenuating circumstances Procedure.</li> <li>The regulations on Module Assessment Boards (MABs) and Progression and Award Boards (PABs) have been removed. Information on MABs and PABs is included in the Guide on the Operation and Conduct of Exam Boards.</li> <li>The list of approved Derogations from the Standard University Regulations has been removed from the regulations. Derogations that apply to specific courses are set out in the relevant Course Specification. Tuition Fees Policy	<ul> <li>The name of the policy has been changed to Tuition Fees Payment Policy</li> <li>Early Payment Discounts have been removed from September 2022 onwards</li> <li>An increase in the overseas deposit required on application from £3000 to £4000</li> <li>Scholarships awarded can no longer be used to form part of the 50% deposit</li> <li>Students can only opt for an instalment plan through the invoice payment portal. DBS Panel Guidance	This document sets out arrangements the University makes for holding a Disclosure and Barring Service Panel ('DBS Panel') and should be read alongside the University's Criminal Convictions Policy and Procedure. This part of the Procedure was not practically in use;</li> <li>Introduction of greater expectation management in respect of the impact of claiming;</li> <li>Additional guidance around evidence that can be supported in support of a claim;</li> <li>Removal of the academic appeal stream specific to late EC claims. Student Academic Engagement Policy	appeal stream caused confusion to students and staff and it was felt more appropriate to consider late claims within the EC Procedure;  • A new appeal stream has been added, for use in circumstances where a student has made an unsuccessful EC claim and an unsuccessful query;  • Guidance has been added in respect of timeframes at the formal and review stages;  • The fast-track for appeals has been removed because in practical terms this represented a duplication of the informal resolution stage;  • An update process flowchart has been added to the Procedure.
