	<p>Are you passionate about creating high-production films? Our BA (Hons) Filmmaking with a Foundation Year will develop your technical skills and knowledge to pursue your dream career. On this course, you'll start by exploring fundamental core skills such as media production, academic writing, researching and collaborative practice using state-of-the-art facilities and studios, which will prepare you to start the first year of the BA (Hons) degree.</p> <p>About the Foundation Year</p> <p>The Foundation Year course option enables you to study for our BA (Hons) degree over an extended full-time duration of four years by including a Foundation Year (year one of four). The Foundation Year provides a broad study programme that underpins the follow-on degree. To progress to the next year of your degree, it is necessary to achieve a pass in all the Foundation Year modules.</p> <p>Overview</p> <p>Our practice-based, industry-focused BA (Hons) Filmmaking course enables you to develop creative and technical skills across a broad spectrum of filmmaking practices. You will be taught by experienced practitioners and scholars who support experimentation, craft development, and professional practice within the rapidly evolving world of the moving image. What makes our course distinctive is the focus on the language of cinema. You will learn how professional filmmakers combine image, sound, editing, performance, storytelling, and collaboration to shape emotion, meaning and audience experience. Through hands-on practice, you will explore how every creative choice, from performance and camera to sound design and structure, helps to bring a story to life. Working in our purpose-built studios, sound stages, and on location, you will build practical skills, grow your confidence, and learn how to contribute effectively as part of a filmmaking team.</p> <p>We encourage you to explore different forms of film production, including narrative film, documentary and more personal approaches to cinema. Through practical projects and critical reflection, you will develop as both an artist and a filmmaker, building your creative voice alongside the practical skills, confidence, and experience needed for a successful career in the screen industries.</p>

	<p>What's covered in this course</p> <p>This course gives you the chance to explore a wide range of filmmaking styles, techniques, and creative approaches, from classic storytelling to the ever-evolving norms of today's fast-changing screen industries. You will learn how filmmakers bring stories to life through image, sound, editing, performance, and collaboration, building both your creative understanding and practical skillset.</p> <p>Alongside making your own work, you will study key film traditions, from early Hollywood cinema to contemporary international filmmaking, and discover how different genres, cultures and voices have shaped the language of film. You will also build valuable industry knowledge through engagement with guest speakers, film festivals, entrepreneurship, and the active expansion of your own professional network.</p> <p>How you will learn</p> <p>Practical filmmaking sits at the heart of our course, supported by a mixture of lectures, seminars, screenings, workshops, and production sessions. You will work collaboratively in filmmaking teams, developing professional skills across directing, cinematography, sound, editing, production design, and more. You will also undertake personal film projects that allow you to explore your own creative interests and develop your voice as a filmmaker. Regular screenings and analytical discussions will deepen your understanding of how filmmakers create meaning through image and sound, and how storytelling works across different cinematic traditions, styles, and cultures.</p>

13 Overall Student Workload and Balance of Assessment
