6	Course Description
	<p>Theatre with Passion and Purpose</p> <p>At Royal Birmingham Conservatoire we seek to prepare the next generation of passionate and skilled theatre-makers to work across the entire spectrum of Applied Theatre. Our focus is on developing the skills and understanding needed to create compelling new performances and theatre projects with purpose.</p> <p>This is not a traditional acting course. Although there are some taught sessions and you will benefit throughout from the advice and support of experienced practitioners, the emphasis is on learning by doing – on bringing the skills and passions you have and getting better by applying them; as well as gaining new skills. You will not only be creating new drama, but gaining the knowledge and understanding needed to communicate that message in the wide variety of environments covered by the term Applied Theatre – such as theatre in education, community theatre, health, prisons, hospitals, or out on the streets.</p> <p>Through a range of projects you will transform yourself from student to professional practitioner. By working in partnership with your tutors, and increasingly independently, you will begin to identify and undertake the roles of performer, deviser, writer, performance maker and facilitator. You will work with a range of artists and professional companies along the way, allowing you to experience different styles and formats that will inform your own practice. Everyone who teaches on our Applied Theatre course is an experienced professional practitioner, with a strong commitment to the industry.</p> <p>Throughout the course you'll have the opportunity to develop your own artistic practice as well as specialise within your own areas of interest, giving you the chance to craft your future career. You will regularly work away from the Conservatoire – this might be with young people, community groups and a wide range of participants from different backgrounds. As part of the course you will complete a 6-8 week full-time placement with a theatre company or similar organisation; we believe that the best way of developing your skills is to be out there applying them.</p> <p>Learning through Doing</p> <p>You will collaborate with your fellow students by forming professional 'companies' in which you will work collectively. Within this company you will be expected to undertake individual roles and responsibilities, developing your professional abilities and teamwork skills.</p>

Professional practice is at the core of this course. Our strong industry links and on-going relationships with reputable education and community-based organisations allow us to prepare you thoroughly for a varied career in applied theatre.

We believe that creating theatre with social and political objectives can have a significant impact on the lives of individuals and communities. We use performance as a tool to explore the world, raise awareness, educate, empower, and instigate real and lasting change.

With a primary focus on performance you will also explore the reasons behind theatre, looking at history and theories, while developing an understanding of the need for constant research, discussion, reflection and development of your practice. As an emerging practitioner we aim to supply you with artistic space, autonomy and the choice you will need to succeed after graduation.

You will have regular opportunities to feed back on the course and modules, both formally through the BCU structures, and informally through close contact with your tutors, and you will have the support of personal tutors throughout your time on the course.

Working in the Real World

The course is partnered with Birmingham Repertory Theatre, one of the UK's leading production theatres, which gives you fantastic opportunities to engage with The REP's facilities, productions and Learning and Participation programmes. We also have strong ongoing relationships with a large number of other key partners such as Big Brum and The Playhouse – two of the most established and highly rated TIE Companies in the UK – as well as Geese Theatre (the UK's leading prison theatre company), health specialists HEARTH, Women and Theatre, MAC, Hanyong Theatre, Stan's Café, Loudmouth, adding up to a total of more than 60 professional companies in the Midlands. We are particularly proud to collaborate with the West Midlands Fire Service on a long term project which aims to deliver safety through drama at the Safeside village.

The course embraces students from a wide variety of performance backgrounds and actively encourages you to develop your own areas of interest and practice. Recent students have included spoken word artists, musicians/singers, dancers and those with interests as diverse as puppetry and arts administration. If you are passionate about the power of theatre, you want to make your voice heard, and you hope to make a difference using your own unique abilities, this is definitely a course to consider.

The course is packed with highly transferrable skills, and we have a strong and proud track record of graduates gaining employment across a wide range of careers. Many students have gone on to work with a small-scale and independent theatre company, or to develop their own new companies, or pursue freelance work within the industry. Others have gone into other related creative fields, such as arts education, or running youth theatres or dance groups. Some opt for training to be drama teachers, or drama therapists, or progress on to further study – from 2019 we will be offering our own MA course to graduating students. Applied Theatre graduates from Royal Birmingham Conservatoire are going to be changing the world; our journey is just beginning.
